- Startups lack the legal and financial resources to comply with multiple state regulations.
- Critical venture capital and other investments become more cautious when regulatory risk increases.
- Innovation consolidates among large incumbents, reducing competition and choice.
- Regulatory fragmentation raises costs, slows adoption, and limits investment in housing-focused solutions.

RETTC has developed an AI framework for rental housing that prioritizes renters, and encourages responsible use of technology, creating a system that's built for the present and the future.

 - Improved renter outcomes
- This demonstrates that responsible innovation is already happening—without the need for a patchwork of conflicting laws.
